Homes and Community Renewal: COVID Rent Relief Program

NYS COVID RENT RELIEF PROGRAM NYS RESPONSES TO FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS

New York State has launched the [COVID Rent Relief Program](#) to offer support to households whose ability to pay rent has been impacted by the COVID-19 public health and economic crisis. The online application was released on July 16th and will be open for two weeks concluding on July 30th.

HWCLI has received several questions from clients and colleagues regarding the program. We collected the questions to send to the NYS and received the following responses from NYS. Please let us know if other questions regarding the program arise so that we can continue to provide clarification to clients.

1. The state is asking for name, date of birth, and income information as well as: "Does this person have a Social Security Number, Tax Identification Number, or Alien Registration Number? (circle one) Yes No". What assurances (if any) can we give clients who have

undocumented family members in the household that they are declaring? Could this assistance be considered a public charge service?

- It is unlikely that it would be considered for public charge purposes due to the nature of the subsidy. However, it is highly advised that people should consult with an immigration attorney for assistance. The Office of New Americans 1-800-655-7636 can provide assistance.
2. The application asks if clients are receiving anything from the following rental subsidy providers: "HEPS, CITYFHEPS, SCRIE, DRIE, HASA, ACS Housing Subsidy, Other (specify):" Is it possible to use the full names for these programs in case clients don't recognize them? Would EFSP count as an "other"? Are there any other programs our clients may be receiving assistance from that we should advise them to declare?
 - HCR(NYS) is currently working on addressing and will be corrected on application early this week. Also, looking into part two of question and will provide guidance if necessary.
 3. Is just one proof of income required?
 - In most instances yes.
 4. Is it necessary to submit proof of citizenship/eligible immigration status (Birth Certificate, Green Card) for the household member that has citizenship or eligible immigration status?
 - Yes.
 5. As proof of rental, if the tenant was not provided with a contract or agreement, can a written statement from the landlord be enough and does it has to be notarized?
 - The applicant can fill out an attestation in lieu of a lease or contract. It does not need to be notarized.
 6. When it says that the applicant needs a "Government Issued ID" to apply, does that include a foreign passport or foreign ID card (for undocumented applicants)?
 - Yes.
